#### Handheld Devices Ban Takes Effect June 5

A new Pennsylvania law banning the use of handheld devices while driving takes effect on June 5.

Paul Miller's Law limits the use of handheld cellphones or other communication devices while operating a motor vehicle. The law is named for a young man who was killed in a crash involving a distracted tractor-trailer driver in Monroe County, Pennsylvania, in 2010.

Under the law, driving while holding a mobile device is a primary violation, meaning police can pull over drivers solely for the violation. For the first 12 months, the penalty is a



written warning. Effective in June 2026, the penalty is a summary offense, which carries a \$50 fine, plus court costs and other fees. If a driver is convicted of homicide by vehicle and driving while distracted, they may be sentenced up to an additional five years in prison.

Drivers can still use their phones if using hands-free technology, such as a docking station, Bluetooth or speaker technology. You may also use your phone to contact emergency responders.

According to PennDOT, more than 11,000 crashes were the result of distracted driving, leading to 65 deaths and 6,700 injuries in 2023. Pennsylvania joins 28 other states with hands-free laws.

#### **New Sextortion Scam Blackmails Children**

A disturbing new scam involves organized groups of Nigerian cybercriminals targeting American children online. After befriending them – sometimes even posing as their classmates – and exchanging nude photos, the criminals blackmail them and demand money.

Organized Nigerian criminals have increased this practice, known as sextortion, by 1,000% in the last 18 months. It can cause unthinkable consequences, including suicide, after a child is told the images will be sent to their family, friends and everyone in their school if they don't pay.

The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children offers a helpful tool to anyone facing this overwhelming scenario. Take It Down is a free service that allows a child to have a "hash value" –

essentially a digital fingerprint – assigned to the photo being used against them. The "hash value" is then sent out to participating sites such as Instagram, Snapchat and even pornography sites that put a block on the image so it cannot be seen, shared or spread, rendering it useless for the blackmailer. A child never has to upload the photo to the service, nor does anyone ever view the image in the process.

## SBA Relief Still Available to Pennsylvania Small Businesses and Private Nonprofits Affected by Drought and Heat

Deadline to apply for economic injury loans approaching

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) is reminding small businesses and private nonprofit (PNP) organizations in Pennsylvania of the June 16 deadline to apply for low interest federal disaster loans to offset economic losses caused by drought and heat occurring June 18-Aug. 6, 2024.

The disaster declaration covers the Pennsylvania counties of Adams, Cumberland, Dauphin, Franklin, Perry and York.

Under this declaration, SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program is available to small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, nurseries, and PNPs with financial losses directly related to the disaster. The SBA is unable to provide disaster loans to agricultural producers, farmers, or ranchers, except for small aquaculture enterprises.

EIDLs are available for working capital needs caused by the disaster and are available even if the small business or PNP did not suffer any physical damage. The loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable, and other bills not paid due to the disaster.

"Through a declaration by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, SBA provides critical financial assistance to help communities recover," said Chris Stallings, associate administrator of the Office of Disaster Recovery and Resilience at the SBA. "We're pleased to offer loans to small businesses and private nonprofits impacted by these disasters."

The loan amount can be up to \$2 million with interest rates as low as 4% for small businesses and 3.25% for PNPs, with terms up to 30 years. Interest does not accrue, and payments are not due until 12 months from the date of the first loan disbursement. The SBA sets loan amounts and terms based on each applicant's financial condition.

For people who are deaf, hard of hearing, or have a speech disability, please dial 7-1-1 to access telecommunications relay services.

The deadline to return economic injury applications is **June 16**, **2025**.

The Foundation for Enhancing Communities (TFEC) has launched a public request for proposals (RFP) to identify a consultant to guide the organization's next strategic plan. This initiative will help TFEC shape its priorities and expand its impact across Central Pennsylvania over the next three to five years.

In 2024, TFEC awarded over 2,000 grants totaling nearly \$9.2 million and welcomed 20 new charitable funds, bringing the total to over 1,000. The organization also raised more than \$14 million to support a wide range of causes, including education, health care, community development and the arts.

As TFEC prepares for its next chapter, the strategic plan will serve as a roadmap for strengthening relationships, improving services and advancing equity throughout its five-county service region.

We wanted to inform you of a significant legislative development that could impact your tax planning and financial strategy.

On May 22, 2025, the House passed the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act," aimed at restoring and expanding several provisions from the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act (TCJA) of 2017. This proposed legislation aligns with President Trump's economic priorities and is positioned as a significant step toward extending tax relief for families, workers, and small businesses.

Some of the most notable tax provisions included in the bill passed by the House:

#### For Business Owners

#### Permanent Extension & Enhancement of Section 199A Deduction

The qualified business income deduction becomes permanent. The deduction rate increases from 20% to 23%.

#### 100% Bonus Depreciation & Enhanced Section 179 Limits for fixed assets

100% bonus depreciation for property placed in service after January 19, 2025, and before January 1, 2029. No bonus depreciation for property placed in service after 2030.

A new elective 100% bonus depreciation for newly constructed and certain existing non-residential real estate used for manufacturing tangible personal property, agricultural production, chemical production, or refining.

Section 179 expensing increases to \$2.5 million, with phase-outs beginning at \$4 million for property placed in service after December 31, 2024.

#### Interest Expense Limitation

For tax years beginning in 2025 through 2029, the interest expense limitation is expanded to include 30% of income before depreciation and amortization.

#### Research and Development Expenses

Domestic research and development expenditures may be expensed instead of amortized over five years for tax years beginning after December 31, 2024, and before January 1, 2030.

#### Pass-Through Entity Taxes

The bill would deny partnerships and S Corporations the ability to deduct certain state taxes that are taxed at the entity level. Instead, these items are separately stated and subject to the state and local tax itemized deduction limit.

#### **Excess Business Losses**

Excess business losses limitation (currently \$616k for MFJ) is permanently extended. The current law allows an excess business loss to become a net operating loss in the subsequent. The proposed bill would require excess business losses to be carried forward and be subject to future year excess business loss limitations.

#### **Opportunity Zones**

Extend the deadline for making an opportunity zone investment to December 31, 2028, and a new category of rural opportunity zones with more favorable rules.

#### **Employee Retention Credit**

Denial of ERC refunds filed after January 31, 2024, regardless of whether ERC claims were timely and valid under existing law.

#### For Individual Taxpayers

#### Lower Tax Rates Made Permanent

The Tax Cut and Jobs Act lower seven-tier tax rates and brackets (10%, 12%, 22%, 24%, 32%, 35%, 37%) are permanently extended.

#### Expanded AMT Relief

The individual Alternative Minimum Tax exemption and associated thresholds are permanently extended

#### Standard Deduction Increase

The current "nearly doubled" standard deduction becomes permanent. For tax years 2025–2028, it's further enhanced by \$1,000 (single), \$1,500 (HOH), and \$2,000 (MFJ).

#### Itemized Deductions

The Pease limitation on itemized deductions is replaced with a cap on itemized deductions offsetting income taxed at a top rate of 32%.

Increase the State and Local Tax limit from \$10,000 to \$40,000. The limit decreases for modified gross income that exceeds \$500k.

#### Expanded Child Tax Credit

The \$2,000 Child Tax Credit is made permanent, indexed, and increased temporarily to \$2,500 for 2025–2028.

#### Tax Relief on Tips & Overtime Pay

A new above-the-line tax deduction for voluntary tips and overtime pay for W-2 and certain 1099 earners through 2028. Tips are still subject to social security, Medicare taxes, and reporting on employees' W-2s.

#### Other Tax Cuts and Jobs Acts made permanent:

- Home mortgage interest deduction is limited to mortgages not exceeding \$750k.
- Personal casualty loss deductions only for federally declared disasters.
- Repeal of miscellaneous itemized deductions.
- Repeal of moving expenses except for certain Armed Force members.

#### Estate & Gift Tax

The estate and gift tax exemption is made permanent, set at \$15 million per individual (\$30 million per couple) for 2026, with future inflation indexing.

While this bill is still in the proposal phase and will undergo further legislative review, it signals a strong intention from Congress to extend and expand pro-growth tax policies. ## UPMC Children's Expands Emergency Transport Services with First-of-Its-Kind ICU on Wheels

UPMC Children's in Harrisburg has expanded its critical care transport services to include pediatric ground and air capabilities, building on decades of neonatal transport that began in 1979. The hospital now offers full-service transport for both ground and air, focusing solely on neonatal and pediatric patients.

This latest expansion of the UPMC NICU transport team to include pediatric ICU patients has led to the region's first dedicated NICU/PICU transport, focused exclusively on transporting critically ill pediatric and neonatal patients. The team has transported over 130 children this year alone and unlike other services in the region, this team does not transport adults, highlighting its sole commitment to children's care.

"Pediatric and neonatal patients have different care needs compared to adult patients," said Rebecca Smith, M.D., pediatric intensivist at UPMC Children's



in Harrisburg. "The transport ambulance is specifically designed and dedicated to our youngest patients and is equipped with all the necessary medical resources to begin treatment at the bedside and during the transfer. As a result of the care they receive from this team, patients often arrive at the hospital in better condition than they were in before transfer. Skilled pediatric and neonatal experts on the transport team take over the care of these patients guided by our Harrisburg NICU and PICU physicians before they are transferred to the pediatric and neonatal units, creating a higher level of care outside of the Harrisburg campus."

Co-managed by Dr. Smith (PICU) and Carey Welsh, M.D., neonatologist at UPMC Harrisburg (NICU), the UPMC Harrisburg PICU/NICU transport team consists of six registered nurses and one clinician who work in a 24-hour rotation. All team members have backgrounds in either NICU or PICU and have received extensive training in respiratory modalities at UPMC Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh.

"Quick access to a critically ill child is the top priority for the transport team," said Dr. Welsh. "Rapid access to specialized care can significantly improve a child's chances of survival and recovery. Unlike regular ambulances, our service delivers the entire NICU and PICU directly to the patient, ensuring that critical care is available immediately upon arrival and during the transfer. In short, we are a pediatric/neonatal ICU on wheels."



The ambulance is equipped with a transport isolette for infants and ventilators, infusion pumps and other specialized equipment for children. When air transport is necessary, the team coordinates with the STAT MedEvac team to ensure safe and efficient transport.

The UPMC Pinnacle Foundation donated the ambulance to the team and assisted in outfitting the isolette, which is a clear plastic enclosed crib designed to create a controlled and stable environment for newborns, particularly for premature or critically ill infants.

"We are incredibly thankful to the UPMC Pinnacle Foundation for their dedication to the health and well-being of our community," said Dr. Welsh. "Their generous donation of an ambulance and their invaluable support in securing the outfitting of the isolette allow us to provide the highest level of

care for infants and their families. This incubator is a vital addition, creating a controlled and stable environment for our most vulnerable newborns, particularly those who are premature or ill."

UPMC Children's in Harrisburg offers 72 beds dedicated to infants, children, adolescents and teens, providing acute and critical inpatient pediatric care. UPMC brings nationally ranked care from UPMC Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh to families in central Pennsylvania, with direct access to its specialists when needed.
