

Safely and securely shred documents containing sensitive information like bank account numbers at my free Fall Document Shredding Event on Thursday, Sept. 4, from 5-7 p.m. at the Hampden Township Pool parking lot at 5001 Park Drive in Mechanicsburg. There is a limit of four boxes per household. No businesses, please. The shredder can handle staples, but please remove paperclips and binder clips in advance.

Slow Down for School Buses

Students are or soon will be returning to class, and that means we will be seeing school buses back on our roads. Motorists, parents and children are encouraged to watch the video above to refresh their memories about how to share the road safely.

Pennsylvania law requires motorists to stop at least 10 feet away from school buses when their red lights are flashing and their stop arm is activated. This applies to motorists when they are behind or traveling alongside a school bus, as well as when meeting the bus or approaching an intersection where a bus has stopped.

Vehicles should remain stopped until the red lights have stopped flashing and the stop arm is withdrawn. Do not proceed until all the children have reached a place of safety.

If physical barriers such as grassy medians, guide rails or concrete median barriers separate oncoming traffic from the bus, motorists in the opposing lanes may proceed without stopping.

Penalties for failure to obey school bus safety laws can result in a \$250 fine, five points on a driving record and a 60-day license suspension. Violators will also be assessed a \$35 surcharge to be deposited into the School Bus Safety Grant Program Account. State law also permits school entities to install and operate a side stop signal arm enforcement system. These civil violations include a \$300 fine but would not assess points or impact insurance ratings.

Parents are reminded to ensure their children are at the bus stop early to avoid rushing. Students should stay where the bus driver can see them while boarding or exiting the bus.

Certified car seat technicians will be on-site to ensure your child's car seat is properly installed at my Car Seat Safety Check and Damaged License Plate Replacement Event on Thursday, Sept. 25, from 4-7 p.m. at Platinum Mitsubishi at 6039 Carlisle Pike in Mechanicsburg. Police will also be available to facilitate damaged license plate replacements. These services are provided at no cost to the community.

License plates eligible for replacement include those that are blistered, peeling or discolored with at least one number or letter unreadable from over 50 feet away. Bring your vehicle with the affected plate attached as well as your current registration card and unexpired driver's license. An officer will determine whether your plate is eligible for replacement and my office will assist you in filing the appropriate form with PennDOT.

The Local Share Account (LSA), Category 4 Facilities Program, a multi-county grant program that includes Cumberland County, is now open, and interested non-profit applicants can apply through the Cumberland Area Economic Development Corporation (CAEDC).

CAEDC is seeking applicants who are a non-profit organization and need funding for projects that benefit their community. Interested organizations are encouraged to contact Alyssa Smith at 717-240-7184 or at alyssa@cumberlandbusiness.com with any questions and to determine if their project aligns with CAEDC's strategic mission.

Eligible uses include:

- Acquisition
- Construction
- · Demolition
- · Infrastructure
- Purchase of vehicles, machinery and/or equipment (excluding uniforms, protective equipment, consumable supplies, and furniture)
- · Planning, consulting, and design costs related to planning projects.
- Engineering, design, and inspection, to include permitting fees, for construction projects not to exceed 10% of the total grant award.
- Contingency costs not to exceed 5% of documented construction and infrastructure costs are permissible.

Interested, qualified applicants can apply on CAEDC's online application at CumberlandBusiness.com/lsa-application.

Complete applications must be submitted to CAEDC by August 31, 2015.

The LSA Grant is funded through the PA Race Horse Development and Gaming Act (Act 2004-71), as amended, which provides for the distribution of gaming revenues through the Commonwealth Financing Authority (CFA) to support projects in the public interest within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.



New Annual Report Requirement for PA Businesses

As reported in January, starting in 2025, Pennsylvania will implement a new annual report filing requirement for domestic and foreign business filing associations. This change, enacted through Act 122 of 2022, replaces the long-standing decennial report requirement and aligns Pennsylvania with the practices of most other states.

This update applies to various business entities, including corporations, limited liability companies (LLCs), limited partnerships (LPs), nonprofit corporations, and more.

Key Details About the Annual Report Requirement

- Filing Deadlines: Deadlines vary by entity type (June 30, September 30, or December 31).
- Filing Fees: \$7 for most entities; \$0 for nonprofits and not-for-profit LPs/LLCs.
- Information to Include: Registered office address, principal office address, name of at least one governor, and names and titles of the principal officers.

Failure to file could result in administrative dissolution or termination, loss of name protection, and other consequences.

UPMC Lactation Consultant: Empowering Families Through Breastfeeding

Breastfeeding is a personal choice, and one that comes with powerful health benefits for both mother and baby. August is National Breastfeeding Awareness Month, making it a great time to highlight how breastfeeding supports lifelong wellness, strengthens bonds, and can even benefit communities as a whole.

Health Benefits for Baby

Breast milk is often called "liquid gold" because of how perfectly it is tailored to meet an infant's needs. It contains the ideal mix of nutrients, antibodies, and enzymes to support healthy growth and development. Research shows that breastfeeding can:

- Reduce the risk of infections, including ear infections, respiratory illnesses, and diarrhea.
- Lower the likelihood of developing asthma, obesity, and type 2 diabetes later in life.
- Promote better brain development and cognitive performance.

Breastfeeding is also linked to a lower risk of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS), especially when continued through the baby's first six months.

Health Benefits for Mom

The benefits of breastfeeding are not one-sided. Breastfeeding can help mothers recover from childbirth more quickly by stimulating uterine contractions, which reduces postpartum bleeding. Over time, breastfeeding has been shown to:

- · Lower the risk of breast and ovarian cancers.
- Reduce the likelihood of developing type 2 diabetes and high blood pressure.
- Support natural weight loss after pregnancy.

It can also offer emotional and mental health advantages, such as improved bonding and a reduced risk of postpartum depression.

How Communities Benefit

Beyond individual families, breastfeeding offers wide-reaching public health benefits. Fewer infections and chronic conditions in infants lead to lower health care costs for families and the health care system. Breastfeeding/breast milk feeding can be lifesaving in times of emergencies and natural disasters when resources may be limited.

Communities that support breastfeeding — through lactation-friendly workplaces, public spaces, and health care policies — often see better health outcomes and higher employee satisfaction. Over time, this contributes to a healthier population and less strain on public health resources.

Support and Flexibility Matter

While breastfeeding is a natural process, it can come with a learning curve. The good news is that many of the common challenges—like finding a comfortable latch, understanding milk supply, or balancing breastfeeding with daily routines—can be overcome with support, patience, and practice. With the right resources and encouragement, many parents find breastfeeding to be a rewarding and bonding experience. Support from family members, health care providers, lactation consultants, and employers can make a big difference in helping new parents reach their feeding goals.

It's also important to recognize that not everyone can or choose to breastfeed or provide breast milk—and that's completely okay. Every family's feeding journey is unique, and some experiences may be shaped by factors beyond their control. Our goal is to provide evidence-based education so that every family can make an informed feeding decision that feels right for them—and we are here to support whatever that choice may be. No matter how you feed your baby, you are providing the love, nourishment, and care they need to grow and thrive.
